AAPD Summer Internship Program

College students, graduate students, law students, and recent graduates with all types of disabilities are placed in summer internships with Congressional offices, federal agencies, non-profits, and for-profit organizations in the Washington, DC area. Each intern is matched with a mentor who will assist them with their career goals. Campus to Careers Program

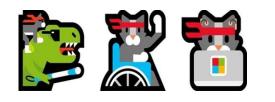

Entry Point!

Entry Point!, a signature program of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Project on Science, Technology and Disability, is a national effort to discover and develop talent among undergraduate and graduate students with disabilities who demonstrated a talent and interest in pursuing a STEM career. The primary goal of the program is to increase the diversity of the scientific and engineering workforce at the professional level.
